#### 3. COURSE CONTENT

The course explores the growing anthropological interest in the ways new technologies are transforming and reconfiguring the human cultures and human relations. More specifically, the study of sound/image recording and reproduction technologies within various cultural contexts brings discussions about the politics of representation to the fore, while it raises important anthropological questions concerning the identity construction, the control of social memory, the emergence of new forms of power, but also of resistance. Each lecture focuses on a different case of ethnographic fieldwork in order to analyse and deepen the indigenous uses of sound/image technologies as well as the ways in which these uses are culturally mediated.
