- 5) Classic representatives of the two fields and their ideas: Plato, Rousseau, Kant, Schlegel, Hegel, Simmel, Rickert etc.
- 6) Contemporary issues of the relation between technical and intellectual civilization: The problems of the institutions and practices demanded for their balanced development.
