1. **3. COURSE CONTENT**

The philosophy of mind mainly investigates the problem of the relation between mind and body. In this course we shall critically examine the main approaches to this problem beginning with Descartes, who defended a form o dualism and set the agenda of the discussion in modern philosophy. We will concentrate on the main theories developed in the 20th century such as behaviourism, identity theory and functionalism. We shall further discuss the problems of intentionality of the mental and of phenomenal consciousness in the context of the prevailing physicalistic worldview, as well as the concept of mental causation and philosophical issues connected with the growth of artificial intelligence.
